Discussion Items

Lee Tree Event:

Baker Prairie Cemetery

- 30 cemeteries in the area that could be part of a bike heritage trail.
- Have bid from contractor Jeff Hilts (on the SHPO approved list) for repair of 26 hazardous and broken markers for \$5,200. He can conduct a 2-3 hour training session for volunteers on how to properly clean markers for \$300. He will be available in the September-October timeframe.
- Timeline: Grant submission – 4/29, notification – 5/15. If receive funding will then issue an RFP.

- Barb suggested placing a plaque at the site. Group agreed. Can make cemetery part of the heritage trail, list on trail brochure, and mark with a heritage trail plaque.
- Carol still pursuing organizational partners. CHS is in. Need to contact Chamber, Rotary, Kiwanis, Arts Council, Library Board, and Garden Club. No response yet from Boy Scouts.
- Carol and Mariah to do grant proposal after effort to obtain partners.

Depot - National Registry

- Cannot use CLG funding, because the national registry staff has classified the property as not-eligible (building move, siting, and removal of warehouse section).
- Since we do not want to lose the funding, will redirect for two intensive level surveys for possible inclusion in our local registry: Dedman's Drugs (now Mattress World) and the Depot. Will also do one for the Bair house. These have been added to Tama's contract.
- Carol has asked the city's Planning Director, Bryan Brown to attend a future meeting to walk this group through the code and the process of a local nomination (for the Depot). This will be the first done using the current code.
- Redirecting the balance of the funds allocated to the National Registry nomination to a Reconnaissance Level Survey of the commercial/residential area on the south side from 3rd to 99e and from Elm to Locust. Jamie issuing the RFP this week.

City Hall

- Historical timeline attached for use in NRHP nomination.
- Next submission deadline is end of June.
- Work on a mini-exhibit for new civic center will require funding – CLG grant is the most appropriate. Not available until 2017. Will work with Amanda and Nora after Civic Center is completed (September).

Heritage Trail

- Received \$1,200 requested in Clackamas County Tourism and Cultural Affairs grant. Can use for RFP for design of plaques (CLG funding for design of brochure also included in the RFP). Mariah to release this week. **Great work Mariah, the Queen of Grant Funding.**
- Joint RFP for design of plaques and brochures to be issued when know status of grant request, estimated release –end of March.

Intensive Level Surveys - Second Round

- Tama on track to complete this month.

Board Expansion

- Planning commission approved
- On City Council agenda for 4/20
- Carol to begin recruiting after approval

Oregon Heritage Conference

- Jamie, Mariah, Carol, and Barb to attend. John Serlet may attend.

Local Site Registry

- Will do documentation on the Bair House and Wedding Chapel after Tama submits intensive level surveys. Carol to do the Mack House.
- Then we will need to create list for posting on city website. Advised Bryan will have complete by end of Q3.
- The Knight House is on the National Registry and we have the documentation but it is currently for sale. Carol needs to research next steps since the property does not have historical protection overlay zoning

1931-2

When the property owners failed to pay assessments for street improvements, the city took control of the vacant lots now occupied by the city hall. After clearing the liens and paying back taxes, city officials unsuccessfully offered the lots for sale at a sheriff's auction.⁴

1935 Confronting the problems associated with an aging city hall, the city council explored the option of erecting a new facility. The siting of the structure generated a community-wide debate pitting those who favored rebuilding on the existing site (on 1st, between Fir and Grant) against those supporting the council's preferred location on the city's vacant property at 2nd and Holly. The former argued that a modern city building would improve the appearance of the main street and encourage other business owners to upgrade their properties.⁵

1936 The council held a special election to authorize construction of a new city hall that would house the jail, fire equipment, and other city services at the Holly Street site.⁶

Despite strong opposition, Canby voters approved the measure by a margin of nineteen votes. The council proceeded with plans to finance a portion of the cost using federal funding through New Deal programs, hiring Jones and Marsh, a Portland architectural firm to design the structure and submit the grant request. When the Public Works Administration (PWA) re-opened its grant program at mid-year, Canby's request came under consideration.⁷

In July, city leaders learned they would receive a \$5,300 grant, which would cover a significant portion of the anticipated \$12,000 cost of construction. In September, the council opened the construction bids and awarded the project to the low bidder, Robinson, Robinson, and Scott of Portland, who hired Canby subcontractors for plumbing, painting, and other tasks.⁸

The building specifications and blueprints described an unfinished basement to be used for a furnace and storage and a first floor with rooms for city services, fire crews, a council chamber, storage, a jail

facility, and a side annex for fire equipment. The jail doors from the existing jail site were to be reused. There are no detailed plans for the top floor, it is depicted as an open space between the ceiling and the roof.⁹

1937 After completion of the new city hall, the council authorized improvements not included in the original plans, including the construction of sidewalks, a rear driveway, and a hose tower for the fire department, as well as purchases of a fire siren, window blinds, floorcoverings, and shrubs for exterior landscaping.¹⁰

At the June council meeting, Mrs. C.P. Shewey requested the city's assistance in establishing a library. Having obtained a Works Progress Administration (WPA) grant to pay a librarian, advocates needed a site for the facility. The council approved use of the council chambers and appointed five residents to a library board.¹¹

1950 Additional equipment to serve an expanding fire department outstripped the capacity of the side annex garage. In response, city leaders authorized purchase of property on SE 2nd and Grant and approved funds to construct a new fire hall. They retained an auxiliary fire operation in the city hall annex.¹²

1957 First Recommended by Mayor Archie S. Markee in 1949, the council approved construction of a vault in the existing storage area.¹³

1957 With first floor space filled, the city council ordered the remodel of the basement to provide space for the Police Department and Public Works Department.¹⁴

1961-2 Again confronted with space constraints, city leaders considered a major remodeling of city hall, hiring architect Frank Kendall to do a preliminary design. After receiving an initial cost estimate of \$13,000, the council authorized construction of a rear annex to accommodate the auxiliary fire equipment, a remodel of the side annex to serve as the new library, and an upgrade of the main floor that included enlarging the council chamber and erecting a dais to hold a u-shaped council table. Construction began in August after Irwin Construction of Canby submitted the low bid of \$14,957. Anticipating future growth, the council also purchased a residence on NW 2nd, adjacent to city hall, to accommodate future expansion.¹⁵

To celebrate the remodeling, the council hosted an open house, inviting all former Canby office holders, the mayors and council members of twelve surrounding cities, as well as county and state officials to the February 17th afternoon event. Attendees enjoyed refreshments served in the library by the Canby Garden Club, tours led by city employees, and a special session of the council that included remarks by Canby resident, State Treasurer Howard Belton. Mayor Earl Oliver introduced former council members in attendance, including Oramel R. Mack who served on the first city council in 1893. The mayor of Canby Minnesota sent a floral arrangement and a congratulatory statement. Two-hundred twenty-five people signed the guest book.¹⁶

- 1965 As part of the ongoing maintenance of a building entering its fourth decade, city leaders authorized a new roof.¹⁷
- 1967 After five years in the side annex, the library began to outgrow its space. The debate over how to address this issue continued for the next decade and included several relocation proposals and one that involved consolidation with the high school library, an idea that generated strong opposition.¹⁸
- 1973 As the city staff enlarged to meet the needs of a growing population, space became an issue for all departments, a problem exacerbated by the existence of code violations detected by the state building inspector. To address the complexities of governing a growing community, the city council hired its first city administrator, Harold A. Wyman. Lacking space on the main floor, Wyman used an office in the basement previously assigned to the superintendent of public works. Wyman made overcrowding at city hall a top priority.¹⁹
- In response to the space limitations, the utility board, which occupied an office on the main floor and space for maintenance employees in the basement, became the first department to vacate city hall, leasing space at 465 SE First. The basement continued to house the public works department (accessed off of 2nd Avenue) and the police department (accessed in the rear of the building).²⁰
- In the fall, the city authorized funding to address code violations, upgrade the main floor with new paneling and carpeting, repaint the

council chambers, and update the main floor utility board office to accommodate City Administrator Wyman.²¹

1975-6

The issues associated with an aging structure with limited space continued to surface. In a letter to the editor of the *Canby Herald*, resident Gary Pope expressed his concerns about a police department housed in “cramped quarters” with exposed plumbing, and a steep stairwell that hindered public access.²²

In response, the council authorized funds to remodel the rear annex to serve as the council chamber, upgrade city hall, and to correct problems identified by the state fire marshal.²³

Additionally, the council approved purchase of farm acreage between Territorial Road and the Willamette River (Collins property) for use by the public works and utility maintenance and construction crews.²⁴ Concurrently, they appointed a citizens’ committee to study building a civic center that could house city services in one location. This effort continued over the next four decades as various committees and consultants studied and proposed a variety of options.²⁵

- 1977 After considering multiple proposals over a period of ten years, the council authorized moving the library to the basement of the Graham Building, renting 3,000 square feet of space for \$7,050 per year.²⁶
- 1978 The Canby Utility Board unveiled plans to construct an office on NW 1st between Holly and Ivy.²⁷
- 1979 The city council approved the purchase of the Koehler Building on the corner of 1st and Holly for use as a library or a police headquarters. The debate over how to use this site continued for five years.²⁸
- 1981 The city installed double-paned windows in city hall.²⁹
- 1984 The installation of 911 dispatch equipment made the crowded conditions in the police department, now the sole occupants of the basement, worse. The city also faced the challenge of finding new space for the library, which had outgrown its home in the basement of the Graham Building. Once again the council explored the options for a new city center. These included moving all city services to the Graham Building, constructing a new city hall on the existing site, and building a new facility at a different site.³⁰
- Concurrently, the council put in motion plans to fix the immediate concerns associated with city hall: maintenance and compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). To address the former, the group authorized funding for new gutters and painting the interior. To comply with the ADA, they approved purchase of a new front door

and a CCTV intercom system to enable access to the police department from the first floor.³¹

1985 City Administrator Bud Atwood negotiated a lease agreement with the Masonic Lodge for use of the first floor to house the library. The library moved into the space in April.³²

1985-6 To address the needs of the police department, the council approved a remodel of the Koehler Building. Construction began in early 1986.³³
